Pastoral Epistles and Ecclesiastical Polity in the New Testament

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What is the ministry of the Church's officers, its bishops, elders, and deacons? What relation does they bear to the apostles of Jesus? What functions and authority do they exercise? This course offers a close reading of all the texts of the NT relevant to the question of church office, especially the relevant passages of Acts and the pastoral epistles (1 and 2 Timothy and Titus). It also surveys the most important subsequent texts on the origins of office, from the historical claims of Ignatius and Jerome in the patristic era to the councils and church order literature, to the Reformers, to scholars like Kloppenborg and Alistair Stewart in modern times. We will evaluate the claims for presbyterial, episcopal, and congregational polity, the origin of the laying on of hands, the place of the apostolate in the NT church, and the role of Paul's assistants. We will also assess the theories of jure divino prelacy, synagogal origins, house churches, and Greco-Roman associations. One week will also be devoted to the question of women's ordination.

NT texts will be interpreted in light of their Jewish background, including comparisons with the Dead Sea Scrolls and Rabbinic literature. Attention will also be given to the Greco-Roman background of associations and religious collegia. All sources will be read in translation, but appeal will often be made to the original languages of texts.

Meetings

The class meets via Zoom at the link posted in the Google classroom. Recordings are posted after each class. The class is run in a "flipped classroom" format, with 30-60 minute pre-recorded audio lectures by the instructor each week, and assigned discussion questions to get the in-class discussion started. Some weeks will also devote 30 minutes of class time to a presentation by one of the for-credit students on a selected work of secondary literature. The procedure and criteria for grading these presentations will be discussed in class and via the Discord channel.

Grading

50% - a final paper chosen in consultation with the instructor.

50% - an oral examination in which students will be asked to (1) comment on a passage of the pastoral epistles and (2) respond to a contemporary published view on some controversy regarding ecclesiastical office in a way that demonstrates scholarly understanding of the concepts and sources covered in the course.
